'I Am History' – exchanging cultural experiences

Cince October 2022, Northgate **J**High School has been fortunate enough to launch an exciting project funded by Suffolk Standards and Excellence in Education called 'I Am History'. The project involves a group of Northgate students from a wide range of cultural backgrounds working with students in a Romanian school, Liceul Penticostal Betel. Students from both schools have been meeting regularly online to share their culture and local history, traditions and recipes. More recently they have been writing to one another, building strong friendships.

The project members also worked with The Hold - Suffolk Archives to explore the history of Ipswich, and will be involved in recording the project and personal stories of students here and in Oradea. This will form part of an exhibition called 'Arrivals: Celebrating Migration to Suffolk', which will run at The Hold from November 2023 to April 2024.

As part of the project, in April, Northgate welcomed ten students and three teachers from Liceul Penticostal Betel to experience a day in our school.

The purpose of the trip was for

the students to exchange cultural experiences, expand their horizons and enrich their knowledge of the world.

The first activity of the day was the welcome to our school tour. All the guests were very impressed with how well the school is resourced and organised. They admired the students art work, displays and outsides spaces.

After the tour our students joined the group and together they enjoyed some vibrant 'get to know



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each other' activities which allowed the group to interact, learn about each other and enjoy each other's company.

After the delightful visit from the Romanian students from Liceul Pendicostal Betel, in May it was our students' turn to experience the hospitality, school life and rich history and culture of Romania, staying in the beautiful city of Oradea.

Ten of our year 9 students working on the project enjoyed five thrilling days full of sightseeing, history, friendship and delicious local cuisine.

Day 1: Visit to the Jewish Museum (Sinagoga evreiască) to learn about the persecution of Jews in Oradea and the tragic life of Eva Heiman (13 years old) who recorded her experiences from the ahetto in her 'Little Diary'; she wrote 'I want to live at all costs.' However, she, along with her family, were murdered in Auschwitz. We visited her statue in Bălcescu Park later that day. Next, after a nerve wracking 59 metres and 250 stair steps, was a spectacular view of the city from the City Hall Tower and a photo session by Crisul Repede River. The students then visited the Darvass Laroche House, a magnificent home decorated in the style of Art Nouveau and over 100 years old. Finally, a trip around the local zoo of Oradea

and the day ended with a meal in a local restaurant serving Romanian traditional food where everyone tried 'mici' with mustard.

Day 2: Started with Oradea's Fortress where students were immersed in the local history. Out of all the interesting exhibitions present, one that stood out was the Seed Bead Artwork section. We were very fortunate to have the artist present, Dr. Mariana Casian, who took us through all the thought and labour behind her amazing art. Next, there was a 60s and 70s disco for our students to enjoy (Macarena being the favourite) as well as a delicious meal in a popular local traditional restaurant. Day two ended with a visit to The Catholic Cathedral, a building famous for its impressive architecture.

Day 3: Brought the unique and different experience of a school day in Romania.

Positives: lessons are only 50 minutes long with 10 minutes break after each lesson, students stay in one classroom throughout the day - teachers come to them - and the summer holiday begins on the 15th June (and lasts for three whole months!). Negatives: five or six lessons in a day, short breaks and students can be assessed at any time during the lesson by being asked to stand in front of their peers to present the topic learnt, and marked on the spot. General thoughts: school is hard everywhere!



Lunch served 'sarmale', another traditional dish, which was very much enjoyed.

In the evening we climbed to 'Ciuperca', a place from which the whole city can be admired. It was a gorgeous sight that made the endless stairs worth the while.

Day five: On the last day, Romanian and UK students had a tour of the University of Oradea. There were different activities that ended with a debate. Next was a visit to the Tării Crişurilor Museum and a guided tour of the prehistory and more recent history of Romanian exhibitions. Finally, it was time to say goodbye to our hosts. There were tears; however, lifelong friendships and memories have been forged.

Students enjoyed completing their Trip Journals created by Ms. Mills. The best journal was awarded a special chocolate egg prize.



Celebrating our Maths achievements

ver 50 Northgate students from Years 9 to 11 participated in the UK Mathematics Trust Intermediate Maths Challenge Competition held earlier this year. Many received certificates of achievement (pictured above), ranging from Bronze to Gold. The Maths Challenge is a nationwide competition in which students can test their problem-solving and mathematical reasoning skills armed only with pencil and paper. The problems they are asked to solve increase in difficulty, and students gaining a certificate at any level should be proud of their achievement. On top of this, four of our students progressed through to the next round (known as the Kangaroo), which is a great achievement for them and the school.

Every Year the Advanced Mathematics Support Programme (AMSP) runs a series of Maths Feast Events in Suffolk. These bring together teams of Year 10



students from schools in the local area to compete in a friendly set of challenges which test their mathematical skills and logical thinking. This year, two teams of Year 10 students from Northgate took part in the Maths Feast held at Kesgrave High School (pictured



above). Both teams thoroughly enjoyed the challenges and received their certificates of participation from the AMSP team. One of the teams also won the relay round, beating all the other schools on this timed round. A great achievement!

Great successes for our football teams

At a County level we reached five finals, winning three, losing one and having one cancelled mid-game due to a thunderstorm! Under 18 Sixth Form team - County Cup finalists


Despite our exit from the National Cup, which was a bitter pill to swallow, this group of players upheld the standards, morals and values of which we are so verv proud.


