Northgate High School was chosen as one of only 80 sites across the UK for a tree to be planted because of its outstanding contribution to Holocaust education and its close association with Frank Bright MBE. The tree has been sponsored by Miriam and Stephen Kramer

in commemoration of the Association of Jewish Refugees 80th anniversary, and to honour their parents, Fritz (Frederic) Kramer, Lotte Kramer, Siegfried Leopold and Charlotte Leopold who found refuge in the UK from Germany in the 1930s.

"As well as helping to mark the heritage of our members and a place of historic interest associated with them, the planting of this tree enables the AJR to give back to and create a living legacy within the country that became home to the Jewish refugees," said AJR CEO, Michael Newman OBE. "Britain's native

oak trees are in decline and new trees are desperately needed. We hope these 80 special trees will be appreciated by future generations for many decades to come."

The tree at Northgate will act as a platform for telling the story of Britain's Jewish refugees and celebrating their remarkable contribution to British life. It will also form part of The Queen's Green Canopy – the unique tree planting initiative which will mark

Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022, whose organisers have adopted the AJR's project as a "wonderful initiative".

At Northgate the area where the tree was planted will form part of an outdoor classroom area for public




and-community/ and cook some of the dishes!

Inspiring students' future dance steps

The Dance Department recently welcomed Northgate Alumni. Annie, back into the studio to run three creative dance workshops with students in Years 9, 11 and 13.

Annie left Northgate after completing her GCSE and A Level in Dance and studied dance for three years at the Northern Contemporary Dance School in Leeds. After completing her degree, Annie then went on to successfully audition for the prestigious JV2 company which accepts a maximum of twenty dancers from all over the world each year to complete a post graduate diploma while performing and touring with the company.

Annie often comes back to Northgate to talk to our students about careers in dance. However,

this time Annie returned to invite our dance students to participate in some vital research for her first work as a professional artist. Annie is creating a new and original work because she was inspired by how young people are using the 'Karen' meme to call out racism and classism on social media. She has been reaching out to older adults to discuss and explore generational divide of opinion and asked our students for their thoughts and opinions on our society. This has helped inform her research with her company of inter-generational professional performers, exploring the sexism and ageism inherent in the meme as well as how it addresses racism and classism.

Using dance, theatre and text,

Annie is creatively addressing the questions 'How are we all like Karen?' and 'How can we address conflict and have better conversations?' With thanks to the Arts Council England providing Annie with a National Lottery Grant to fund her first project she is currently in her first three weeks of research with her company. The first research period will just about scratch the surface of this massive topic and she can't wait to continue digging in!

Not only did our students experience Annie's creative expertise and were challenged to create work from their opinions, but they were delighted to know that their ideas and their voice will be taken forward and explored in the final production.

The year 7s had a very disjointed

season because of the impact of COVID, but the squad has developed, and it has been so pleasing to see so many students proudly represent the school. Our year 8s had not been able to play during year 7 because of the restrictions. With the squad missing many players for their first game in September due to COVID isolations they were beaten 8-0, but as the season has progressed they have grown in confidence and were only narrowly beaten 2-1 by the same team in the quarter finals of the County Cup. Our year 9 team have

great potential and were beaten in the 3rd round of the National Cup and quarter final of the County Cup by last minute goals. Our year 10 team have just won 3-0 in the semifinals and made the County Cup final. The U18 sixth form team have a semi-final to be played in the first week back after Easter.

Futsal is a fast moving, skillful format of the game that has proved very popular with our student body! Our U15 and U12 Futsal teams made the county finals. Both our teams competed superbly, and it was only an early defeat that resulted in the U15s not taking home the cup.

igh school students experience numerous social and emotional events that can often cause stress, anxiety, anger or frustration.

Here at Northgate High School, we have a wide range of help available to support the wellbeing of our young people; one of which is peer to peer support.

In the academic year 2018-2019 Mrs Naseri and Mr Emery introduced a bespoke Peer Support Ambassador programme. It has been four years since Mrs Naseri has been successfully running the scheme recruiting a new team every year, organising training, meetings and action plans.

Students can apply to become Peer Support Ambassadors at the end of Year 9 after which they receive training and instructions to begin their role as a Peer Support Ambassador in Year 10. There is also the additional opportunity to participate in Anti-Bullying Ambassador training run by The Diana Award charity, one of the leading providers of anti-bullying training. The aim of this training is to equip young people and school staff to tackle bullying through education and empowerment.

Peer Support Ambassadors are a valuable asset, helping out at Northgate open days, Year 7 induction days and preparing and delivering assemblies. They often organise activities and quizzes for morning registration periods demonstrating great initiative and leadership skills. The ambassadors
